ell, the Combine is on the move again. You heard correctly, the Combine has moved but this time only about 38 feet north of its usual location next to Walt's Barn. Why, you ask? To make room for construction of the new 'temporary' Combine shed.

Take a look at the photos accompanying this article. Combine car #101 has just been fully restored. It looks great and we want to keep her looking this way for a long time.

On the other hand, passenger coach #104 has been out in the elements. The sun, wind and rain have all taken a toll. Volunteers out at the Barn have diligently been covering and uncovering the Combine since its arrival November, 2010. A special carport structure has been providing a support for a series of tarps and it has all worked out pretty well. However, the weather is taking these coverings to the end of their life-cycle and something new is needed. On top of that, it takes a small crew over an hour to open and close the tarps for the Combine to be displayed. This is not very efficient and so a new building has been erected over the display area. By the time you read this article, the Combine will be back on its display track under the new shed where it will be better protected and easier for our guests at Walt's Barn to visit

This is only a temporary solution to the storage/display situation.


Webster's defines succession as "the act or process of following in order or sequence."

operations, Sharon found a very capable person, Rita Cisneros, who has quickly proven she's up to the task of processing memberships. With Internet support from Mike Broggie, Jr., Rita is now fully operational. It also helps that Rita's sons are living at home and are giving mom additional computer support. The operations at Walt's Barn in Griffith Park continue to operate as smoothly as a newly polished rail line.
