Carolwood Foundation Plans To Save Walt's Combine Coach by Michael Broggie

LOS ANGELES—Board members of the non-profit Carolwood Foundation have unanimously endorsed a motion to acquire the combine coach, one of the original yellow wooden coaches that was built in 1955 at Walt Disney Studios for Retlaw Enterprises' Santa Fe & Disneyland Railroad.


This coach was known to be Walt Disney's favorite. He said it reminded him of his days working on the Missouri Pacific Railroad as 14-year-old "news а butcher," selling goods to passengers. He kept his provisions of soda pop, newspapers, apples and cigars in the freight area of a combination coach; which also had a seating area for passengers and was commonly referred to as a "combine car."

When the late Carolwood Society Governor Bill Norred traded his Davenport Forney steam engine to Disneyland in exchange for the five yellow passenger coaches known as Retlaw 1. he wanted to use the retired rolling stock on a family resort he planned to develop on 2,500 acres in the northeast corner of Ventura County. The sixth unit of the Retlaw 1 consist was transformed from the Grand Canyon passenger coach in 1976 to the Lilly Belle presidential car in celebration of America's Bicentennial. The first official passengers were the Emperor and Empress of Japan.

Norred stored his five wooden coaches in a private warehouse, where Carolwood Member Tim Lagaly began restoring the combine car. Due to Bill Norred's untimely death. that work was never completed. In 2005, Lagaly was commissioned by Disneyland management to totally restore the Lilly Belle coach, which was rededicated at Disneyland in 2006 on February 15th, the birth date of its namesake, Mrs. Lillian Disnev. Carolwood member, and past president of Disneyland, Matt Ouimet, was responsible for getting the presidential car back on line after it sat idle in the roundhouse for nine years due to its deteriorated condition. The Disneyland roundhouse crew successfully lobbied Ouimet to restore the car.

The Norred family sold four of the yellow coaches to rancher and land developer Rob Rossi, owner of the historic Santa Margarita Ranch north of San Luis Obispo. Rossi has plans to build a storage building and install up to eight miles of narrow gauge track to run his collection of steam engines and rolling stock.

The Carolwood Foundation Board is exploring several options to fund the acquisition. Its members are adamant that Walt's favorite coach needs to be saved because it's an important part of railroading and Disney history and should be preserved for posterity as is Walt's beloved Barn thanks to his family and the Carolwood Pacific Historical Society.

> 80 Years of Pixie Dust By Sharon Broggie



Guess Who's Coming To Town?

Good day. My name is **Bill Reyes** and I am writing to you today to inquire as to how I may be of assistance to the Carolwood Pacific Historical Society. My recent first-time visit to the Barn in February was truly fascinating and has fired up a desire to become involved with my life-long passion of learning all I can about Mr. Disney's railroads, particularly with the DRR. I have been a fan of the Disneyland Railroad since I can remember, and I believe I know about as much as a "civilian" can know without actually having been a Retlaw employee and pulling out the throttle (although Cecil "Hoot" Gibson allowed me to do that as a teenager aboard the E. P. Ripley. Probably a major safety violation, but a few gentle jerks made for a smooth departure, and a life-long memory.).

However, I feel my interest goes beyond "fandom" for you won't find me blogging away on websites, debating about which locomotive has the best whistle and bell, which boiler had a blemish on it the last time I was at the Park, and so on. My passion is more practical, along the lines of DRR construction history, operation, maintenance and preservation, having been in the transportation industry for 30+ years (right up to a recent layoff). I am currently on the waiting list to become an engine crew member on the DRR, and I hear that the list is impossibly long, one can always hope for a shot. As a professional drummer, I have marched down Main Street and popped out of Tomorrowland Terrace and those activities were a fulfillment of a long-time dream as well.

I am not on the waiting list empty handed. My first job as a teenager was as conductor, track worker, maintenance worker, journal box stuffer/lubricator, and, eventually, fireman and engineer for the 18" gauge *Venice Miniature Railway* at Legg Lake/Whittier Narrows Recreation Center in Rosemead, CA. A job inspired by the DRR, and the best experience a young guy could ever have.

I have read the outstanding book *Walt Disney's Railroad Story* from cover to cover and have looked in the binding for even more information. I consider Michael Broggie to be one of the luckiest 12-year-old boys ever, having been there for the first steam-up and tryout on the new rails with Mr. Disney. I have great respect for who his father was, and his marvelous accomplishments.

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

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




VIEW FROM THE CUPOLA

It's hard to believe that over a decade has passed since receiving an urgent phone call from **Diane Disney Miller**. "We have to save Dad's barn!" was the alarm sounded by Walt's eldest daughter in February 1998. Her mother, Lillian Disney, had died the prior December at the age of 98 and the home on Carolwood Drive in Holmby Hills she had shared with Walt and daughters Diane and Sharon was in escrow. Sizable estate taxes dictated the necessity of selling the property.

Gabriel Brenner had purchased the property for \$8 million according to public records. His original intent was to raise his young family in the Disney's home. The discovery of asbestos, lead paint and plumbing, and stability issues with the foundation forced the decision to raze the structures and replace them with a new home.

Diane was certain that her father's Carolwood Barn, which served as his personal railroad workshop would be reduced to rubble. She was also aware that the Carolwood Society had gathered quite a few members who shared a common purpose: to preserve the railroad legacy left by Walt. Immediately, the Society accepted the challenge, launching a rapid series of events that led to the Barn being saved and then carefully reconstructed on a new foundation and frame at the Los Angeles Live Steamers area of Griffith Park. Over 80 percent of the original wood and all the windows were preserved along with workbenches and shelving built with Walt's own hands. The Barn is on loan to the City of Los Angeles by the Walt Disney Family Foundation.

On July 19, 1999, three generations of the Disney family, Los Angeles City officials and hundreds of wellwishers gathered to hear Diane rededicate her dad's "humble barn." She said, "Our hearts and our heritage are in this barn."

As a rare opportunity to directly serve Walt's memory and his family, over the past decade hundreds of Carolwood Society members have contributed thousands of volunteer hours to make the Barn a memorable experience for guests from all over the world who visit free every third Sunday in each month throughout the year.

The Barn also has served as an event site for special occasions such as the 50th anniversary of Walt Disney Imag-

ineering hosted by Marty Sklar. There were memorial celebrations for John Cowles, Jr., the original architect of the Barn; and Disney Legends **Ward Kimball, Ollie Johnston**, and, **Bill Evans**, the original landscape architect for Carolwood and all subsequent Disney resorts.

Last year, Ollie's Depot was moved from the backyard of the renowned Disney animator and miniature live steamer to an area adjacent to Walt's Barn. The two structures serve as a reminder: there's a special bond shared by railroaders who love those mechanical marvels called trains—regardless of the scale or the age of the enthusiast.
